Dear Friends,

Since 1994, MHB has been on a journey to strengthen the City of St. Louis by improving the mental health of its residents. Our role has been to invest in measurable and effective programs that improve conditions and address the needs of our most vulnerable—children, youth, as well as adults with serious mental health conditions.

Over the past 20 years, MHB has:

- Invested over \$133 million in the behavioral health of our City's most vulnerable residents;
- Supported high quality projects at more than 150 partner organizations; and
- Improved the lives of thousands of City residents who received critical services.

Our work is just beginning. In concert with our partners and stakeholders, we are participating in collaborations and/or collective impact initiatives aimed at reducing the rate of severe emotional disorders and youth violence, as well as increasing the number of youth that graduate from high school, and are ready for college or careers.

As a community, we face significant hurdles—but each year we are gaining more knowledge about how to best meet the needs of our dynamic City, as we work together with our partner organizations to meet these challenges.

In FY 2014 we mobilized around our three strategic goals:

- I. Maintaining exemplary stewardship of public funds. MHB converted to a new web-based grants management system for fast, accurate and complete information on individual grants as well as aggregate analyses—making our grantmaking process more outcome focused and user-friendly.
- II. Strengthening a coordinated system of high quality behavioral health services. MHB's Community Children's Services Fund introduced a new evidence-based funding framework aligned with the Ready by 21 St. Louis collective impact initiative. Grant applicants were required to select from a common set of outcomes—further reinforcing alignment. MHB also led a group of public and not-for-profit agencies in securing a federal planning grant to develop a regional "System of Care" for high-need youth.
- III. Working creatively with partners and stakeholders. When we share information and solve problems together, we create a stronger community. MHB participated in at least 15 ongoing collaborations and/or collective impact initiatives such as Ready by 21 St. Louis, System of Care, Regional Early Childcare Coalition, Alive and Well, Resiliency Coalition and the Mayor's Commission on Children, Youth and Families. These groups provide a platform for information sharing and advocacy about behavioral health issues, as well as new partnerships in response to emerging needs.

We believe that strong, healthy people are critical to a robust, vibrant community. We also believe in the power of collective action when diverse groups work toward common goals. As we look toward the next 20 years, we are excited about the prospect of working together with our partners—making our City all that it can be for the people who call St. Louis home and accelerating impact together.

The Saint Louis Mental Health Board (MHB) is responsible for ensuring that the most vulnerable residents in the City of St. Louis receive the behavioral health care they need. Established in 1994, MHB is an independent taxing authority administering two special property taxes approved by the voters to be used for behavioral health services:

- **The Community Mental Health Fund** is focused on the needs of City residents with serious behavioral health conditions. This fund primarily targets adults age 19 and older.
- **The Community Children's Services Fund** is focused on a continuum of behavioral health services from prevention to treatment for City children and youth, birth through age 18.

MHB also actively seeks opportunities to leverage its funds with other sources and currently manages two federal grants that address:

- mental health and housing needs of homeless people
- support and care access for refugees and other foreign-born people


Another major goal is to work with non-profits, funders and community partners to create a more aligned system of services and supports that will achieve measurable impact on critical community level markers of well-being and quality of life. One such initiative is *Ready by 21 St. Louis*, a partnership of many community stakeholders centered upon improving the behavioral and physical health of children and youth and their successful transition to adulthood.

MHB does not provide services directly, but by investing in effective, not-for-profit service providers, MHB makes more high quality services available to the people of St. Louis.




With the goal of improving the well-being of St. Louis City children, the Community Children's Services Fund awards grants to leading community programs serving the City's most vulnerable children. As stewards of tax dollars, the Saint Louis Mental Health Board administers these grants as part of a highly competitive process. Our job is to ensure that this money is invested wisely, and all programs are making a significant impact in the lives of the children in our community. The Community Children's Services Fund focuses on the following impact areas:

- 1) Parents provide safe and nurturing environments for their children.
- 2) Children and youth are successful learners.
- 3) Children and youth have healthy life skills.
- 4) At-risk and troubled children and youth are stabilized.













Through the Community Mental Health Fund, the Saint Louis Mental Health Board invests in evidence-based services for adults dealing with behavioral health disorders, including substance abuse. We award grants to organizations that can show measurable outcomes that improve the conditions and the quality of life of those served. As with all of the public funds entrusted to us, we strive to invest in high-impact partnerships and collaborations that, over time, will create meaningful and lasting change at the community level. The Community Mental Health Fund addresses the following impact areas:


- 1) Individuals with serious behavioral health disorders achieve and sustain progress toward recovery.
- 2) Individuals with serious behavioral health disorders who require frequent interventions across service systems manage their conditions to avoid relapse, or emergencies.
- 3) Individuals with serious behavioral health disorders and other chronic conditions manage their overall health across their lifespan.



Avoid Relapse


Lifetime of Health







U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), Office of Refugee Resettlement (Survivors Partnership) and Care Access for New Americans (CANA)

Over the past 13 years, Saint Louis Mental Health Board has developed and led the Survivors Partnership in concert with CANA which together have formed a holistic system of mental health, legal and related supports for a large and culturally diverse population of new immigrants, refugees and asylum seekers, drawn from the estimated 10,000 survivors of state-sponsored torture who have found a home in the St. Louis area. Blending local and federal HHS, Office of Refugee Resettlement funds, the Survivors Partnership has adapted evidence-based programs such as Motivational Interviewing to meet the unique needs of the survivor population. Service partners include: Places for People, Bi-Lingual International Assistant Services, Center for Survivors of Torture and War Trauma, International Institute, Catholic Family Services, and CIC Consulting.

U.S. Department of HHS, Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (The Transformation Partnership)

The Transformation Partnership was established to make behavioral health services more responsive and housing more accessible to people with severe behavioral health disorders. Saint Louis Mental Health Board has also created strategic partnerships that led to the integration of seven evidence-based programs into the local mental health service delivery system. The Transformation Partnership leads the country in offering the most evidence-based programs of any other partnership funded by this federal program. This has contributed to better outcomes for program participants. The partnership includes: Places for People, Queen of Peace Center, NAMI St. Louis, and UMSL-Missouri Institute of Mental Health.




